Fayette County Board of DD is pleased to offer the workshop, Healthy Lifestyles for People with Disabilities. This class is a holistic wellness workshop designed for people with disabilities.

The workshop embodies the self-determination model, and its ultimate goal is to give participants the tools they need to evaluate their current life situations, identify areas in their lives they would like to improve, and to make positive changes in those areas.

The steps to achieving these goals are separated into four sessions. In sessions one and two, participants define a "healthy lifestyle" and identify values that are important to them. In session three, they learn about the components of a healthy lifestyle and identify the areas that they would like to change to move towards a healthier lifestyle. Finally, in session four, participants learn how to make positive changes in these areas by using a goal-planning process.

In the Healthy Lifestyles workshop, the five areas of a healthy lifestyle are defined as:

- Emotional Health
- Social Health
- Physical Health
- Spiritual Health/Living One's Values
- Health through Meaningful Activities

These areas of a healthy lifestyle are embodied in a Healthy Lifestyles Wheel, a learning tool used throughout the workshop. The wheel is based on current social and psychological research as well as participant input.

The workshop is currently meeting in the conference room at the Fayette County Medical Arts Building on Tuesday evenings from 4-6 p.m. for 10 weeks. This group completed their 10-week session the last Tuesday of March and will continue to meet once a month for six months to support and encourage one another along their journey.

Guest speaker Jeannie Bihl, RN educator from the health department, has visited the group to cover topics such as "portion control" and how to make sense of food labels. Shannon Jacobs from Practical Wellness came to visit one week and taught the class a "Chair Yoga" routine as well as a "mindfulness" deep breathing technique. In the last week of March, participants tried a little "massage" therapy to celebrate completing their 10 weeks!

We are so excited to partner with our health comrades at the Fayette County Hospital to encourage anyone with any type of disability to remember we all have the right to be healthy! We have a great time

sharing and working together to design a healthy lifestyle "game plan" that is unique to each person. Participants identify community resources and supports that will help them achieve their goals. Everyone has a chance to decide how to stay motivated in the quest for a healthy lifestyle.

The next session with new group members will start in September once the six-month follow-up support group meetings with current participants has ended. Coordinated by Elaine Statti, the Board of DD's speech and language pathologist; Jennifer Monahan from PRC presented the latest in this evolving field. In particular, this workshop focused on the use of technology and how to choose vocabulary to maximize functional communication in a variety of settings and activities. Equally important was the understanding of the significance of communication not only to tell someone what you may want but maybe even more importantly to socialize and share information.

END OF YEAR SCHOOL DRILLS



Fayette Progressive Preschool held a drill and practice on Tuesday morning, April 25. An Emergency Management Test is required annually for Ohio Department of Education requirements and as a way to practice and gain information on how plans are executed as part of the school emergency plan. Multiple agencies were notified of the plan including the sheriff, police, fire, and EMS departments. Two classrooms were utilized as part of an evacuation. The drill was very informative on recognizing strengths and areas for improvement. Buses were pulling out of the building within 6 minutes of the drill beginning after teachers and students quickly reached their bus upon notice of the evacuation. Police officers were on scene within a few minutes of the call and the entire drill was over within 11 minutes. We are thankful for the collaboration of all agencies in making our school a safer place!

WHAT IS AQUATIC THERAPY?



Aquatic Therapy is very beneficial for babies and young children to improving strength, flexibility, body awareness, sensory integration, motor planning, and learning how to move their muscles in new ways. The pool is the perfect environment to learn these skills because it's safe, makes movement easy, and it's fun!

Why Water?

Water has always been considered healing or therapeutic and for good reason. Warm water can be relaxing and stimulating at the same time. It's easier to learn to move in the non-restrictive environment of the water than it is on land, plus water therapy can be turned into a very playful time so that therapy doesn't *feel* like therapy.

Here are some of the reasons why you might consider aquatic therapy for your child:

Exercises in the water are low impact. There is much less worry about stressing joints or muscles in the water. This can be a real plus for children with high muscle tone (hypertonia) who have difficulty moving.

The warm water can also relax stiff muscles so kids can gain flexibility in the water they may not have on land.

For kids and babies with low muscle tone (hypotonia), there is much less gravity in the water so it's easier for them to move using less strength. They can be buoyed and supported by the water while they exercise.

Aquatic Therapy is for children with any special need or condition such as:

- Developmental Delays
- Autism
- Cerebral Palsy
- Down's Syndrome
- Orthopedic disorders
- Neurological Conditions





STAND UP SPEAK OUT

FAYETTE ADVOCATING CHANGE TOGETHER

People First of Ohio assists people with disabilities, who are self-advocates, to talk about their needs and rights with people in their communities. Self-advocates make sure that people with disabilities have the right to do what they want in their lives, are responsible for their own choices, and have the right to live and do things in the community like other citizens.

Note: The Fayette County self-advocacy group FACT, has recently been approved as an official People First Chapter of Ohio.

On March 8, 2017, the Fayette County Advocacy group (F.A.C.T.) attended the Ohio Developmental Disabilities Awareness & Advocacy Day at the Ohio Statehouse. This day is set aside for all self-advocates, family members and allies to educate policy makers about the issues most important to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Speakers for the day included Shari Cooper, motivational speaker and writer for the Dayton Daily News; John Martin, director of the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities; Bill Darling, director at Assistive Technology of Ohio, and Stephanie Barber-Maynard, Employment and Training Services Director at Creative Connections. Blues guitarist Zayne Harshaw gave a musical performance of several songs, ending with the crowd's favorite, "Purple Rain".

An unexpected visit from governor John Kasich brought much excitement to those in attendance. Kasich remarked that this has been a community that too often has been ignored. "We are beginning to understand, just beginning to scratch the surface of the amazing, hidden skills," he said of people with developmental disabilities. "You bring about a certain light that no one else can shine, and at the same time, you've changed families and loved ones to have an appreciation of life and to be able to reach out to other people and to make a difference in their lives. That's just changing the world."

At the conclusion of the event, each county had the opportunity to present concerns to their legislators. The selfadvocates representing Fayette County were Buffy, Chad, Doug, Chuck, and Kyler. Buffy and Chad both shared their concerns with Senator Bob Peterson, and State Representative Gary Scherer. Buffy spoke about the Medicaid Marriage Penalty and Chad shared his concerns about transportation.

On April 6, 2017, a few members from the FACT group attended the Arc of Ohio and People First of Ohio Spring Conference in Dublin Ohio. Director of DODD, John Martin shared about the Executive Budget Proposal and its impact to the current waivers. The conference was enjoyed by all members in attendance.

Buffy had this to say about her first People First Conference "I like that I had the chance to speak up about the turnover in direct care, and I appreciated learning more about the different waivers and the changes that will be taking place."

Chuck commented that he enjoyed being with other advocates and learning about putting yourself first, and don't focus on the past, but focus on the future. Matthew said that he loved everything about the conference.
