The new school year is upon us! We are excited to have students back in the classroom for the 2021-2022 school year. Summer seemed to fly by, but we are looking forward to seeing everyone once again. This year, we are operating at full capacity, with half day (morning and afternoon) classes Monday through Thursday. To ensure we keep everyone safe, all staff will be required to wear a face mask when in public indoor spaces. Once in the classroom, masks can be removed. Masks will be required on the bus during transportation. We will monitor the health guidance from Fayette County Public Health, the Ohio Department of Health and the Ohio Department of Education and will make adjustments as needed.

Preschool screening days will be held on August 16th and 17th, with Dr. Fitton and staff joining us to help with screenings and be our community partners. The following week dental screenings will be completed by Dr. Christina Wall. Orientation night will be held August 16th from 6-8pm. Families and students should be receiving letters soon which will indicate their teacher for the year and if they will be in the morning or afternoon class. School starts on August 18th.

We have had a few staffing changes over the summer. Ms. Robin Dettwiller and Ms. Kirby Wary have joined us and will be heading up the second 3 and 4 year old classroom. We are thrilled to have these talented folks on board and look forward to their good work with our little ones at Fayette Progressive Preschool.

We are thrilled to begin new chapters and experiences with the students and can't wait to see their progress as we move through the school year. Youth Mental Health First Aid Training – Submitted by Cheryl Binegar, SSA and Good Life Coordinator

On June 15th, Fayette County Board of DD organized a free virtual training offered to staff, other community partners and parents in our community called Youth Mental Health First Aid. This training was funded and offered by The Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services.

This course taught participants how to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders. This 6 ½ hour training gave adults the skills they need to reach out and provide initial support to adolescents and transition aged youth (ages 12 -21) who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem and help connect them to the appropriate care. An evidence-based program, adopted in over 20 countries, Youth Mental Health First Aid teaches the five-step ALGEE action plan:

Assess for risk of suicide or harm

- Listen nonjudgmentally
- Give reassurance and information
- Encourage appropriate professional help
- Encourage self-help and other support strategies

The course also covered common signs and symptoms of mental illnesses in this age group, including Anxiety, Depression, eating disorders, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), common signs and symptoms of substance use, how to interact with an adolescent in crisis and how to connect the adolescent with help.

Since we know that 1 in 5 youth have mental illness this information was very beneficial to all who attended. Many of the participants were from the FCBDD and will be using this information to assist them with their professional work. 






Fayette County Dragons Host Celebrity Track Meet
